Student Events

Students participated in a variety of events, including research poster sessions and performing arts concerts. The following are a few highlights from this year.

Five College DataFest took place at UMass Amherst, with students receiving a dataset on a Friday evening and presenting findings and insights to the judges that Sunday. This year 194 students registered and 33 teams presented to the judges, making the 2025 event the largest ever.

Approximately 950 students attended **Five College Korean Language events** this year, such as the Korean Culture Festival at Mount Holyoke College, Hangeul Day Celebration at UMass Amherst, and a Conversation with Cho Nam-joo at Smith College.

Approximately 275 students performed in this year's **Five College Choral Festival**, which took place at Smith College in March. Visiting artist Judi Vinar joined for the event, teaching students during the rehearsal and conducting a piece with the entire student group, the Five College Festival Chorale, during the public performance.

Students from all five campuses performed in this year's **Faculty Dance Concerts**, featuring the repertory project *Spent Days Out Yonder*, choreographed by Bill T. Jones and staged by Amherst College faculty Jenna Riegel.

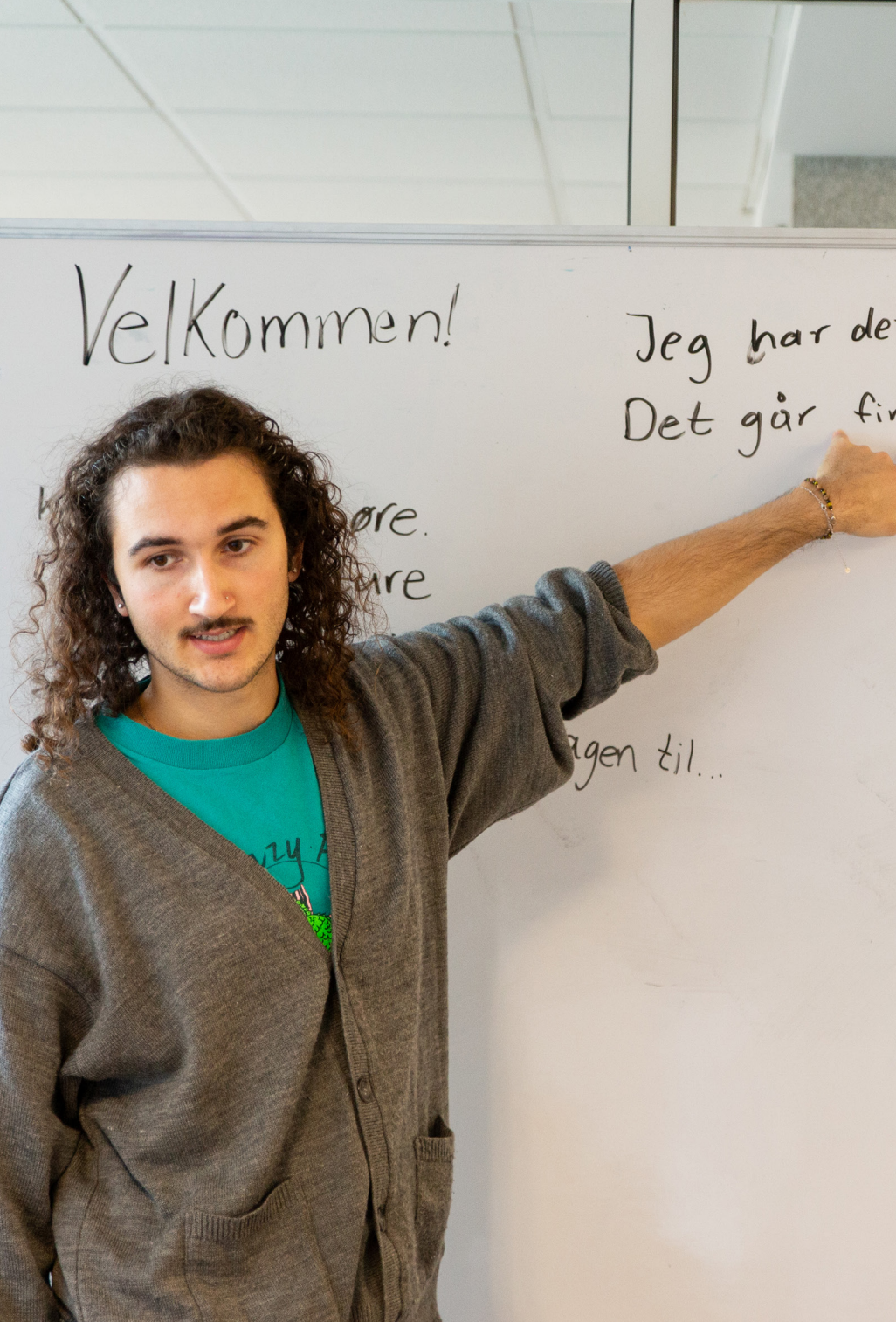
Student Events continued

This year's **Lorna Peterson Prize** was awarded to Sophia Hill, a student at Hampshire College who transferred from New College of Florida. Sophia has studied in the Culture, Health, and Science Program; worked in an internship at the Women's Studies Research Center; and presented at the Five College Undergraduate Anthropology Conference.

The **Coastal and Marine Sciences Poster Session** took place at the Hampshire College Red Barn, where 15 students presented the results of their scientific work conducted through internships, laboratory studies, and field experiences.

The **Five College Prose and Poetry Prize event** was held in the Weinstein Auditorium at Wright Hall, Smith College. Twelve winners were selected from more than 100 submissions, with each campus represented, as well as the Care Center at Bard Microcollege Holyoke.

The **Five College Student Film Festival** took place in Pruyn Auditorium on the Amherst College campus. Prizes were awarded to student filmmakers in three categories: Best Fiction Film, Best Experimental Film, and Best Documentary. Approximately 70 people attended the festival.



Languages

The Center for World Languages offers more than 40 less-commonly taught languages as credit-bearing courses for Five College students. In the 2024-25 academic year, 243 students took courses in 35 languages, and 93% of students met or exceeded their target oral proficiency rating. Three students received scholarships totaling \$3,000 for immersive language study.

LangMedia, the Center's website of Open Educational Resources in more than 50 languages, was relaunched in December following an extensive redevelopment.

Five Colleges also supports four language initiatives, as well as the East Asian Languages Program, which hosts events for Chinese, Japanese, and Korean language students.

FIVE COLLEGE LANGUAGE INITIATIVES

The curricula are coordinated to enable students to progress seamlessly to the next level language course from one campus to another.

Faculty Collaboration

The Five College Building Academic Leaders in the Humanities (BAL) program is a year-long intensive leadership development initiative funded by the Mellon Foundation. In the first three years of the program, there were nearly 150 faculty participants from the five campuses and two area community colleges.

The program featured two tracks— one aimed at faculty serving as department chairs and another for faculty looking to move into deanships and beyond. At least ten of the participants have since gone into more advanced leadership positions. Mellon has approved a one-year extension of the program for 2025-26.

Faculty Collaboration continued

27 Faculty Seminar groups, including *Political Theory, Chemistry, and Educational Policy, Research, and Leadership*, engaging in discussions about scholarly interests and works in progress, and occasionally hosting guest speakers
